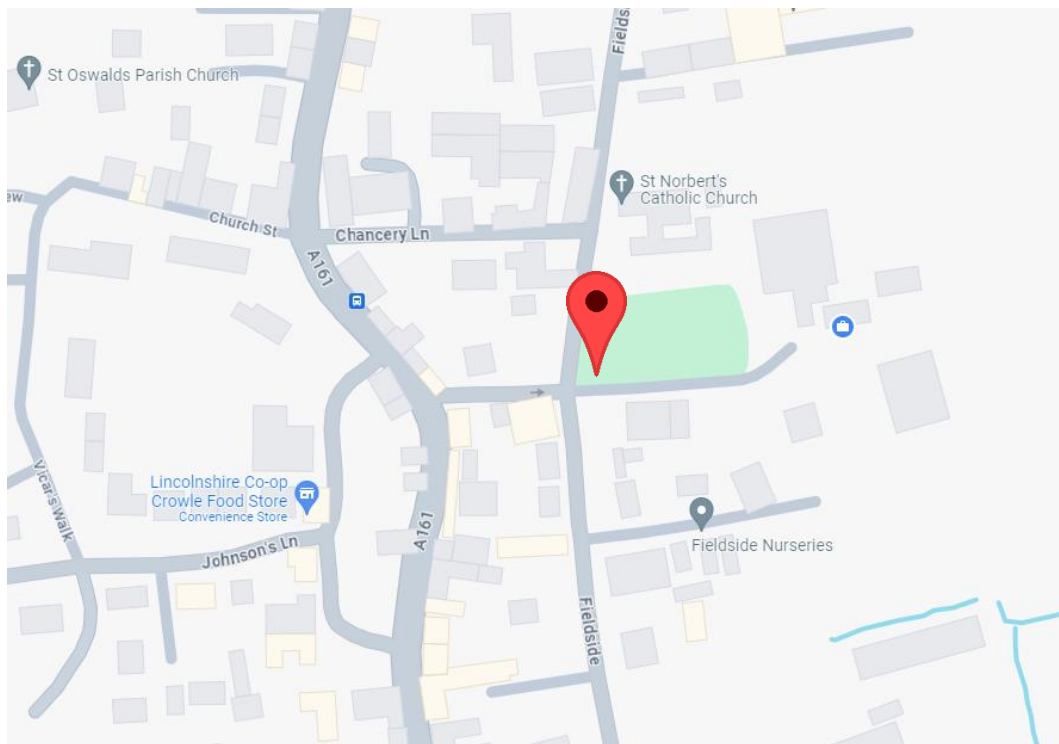

PARENT PARTNERSHIP

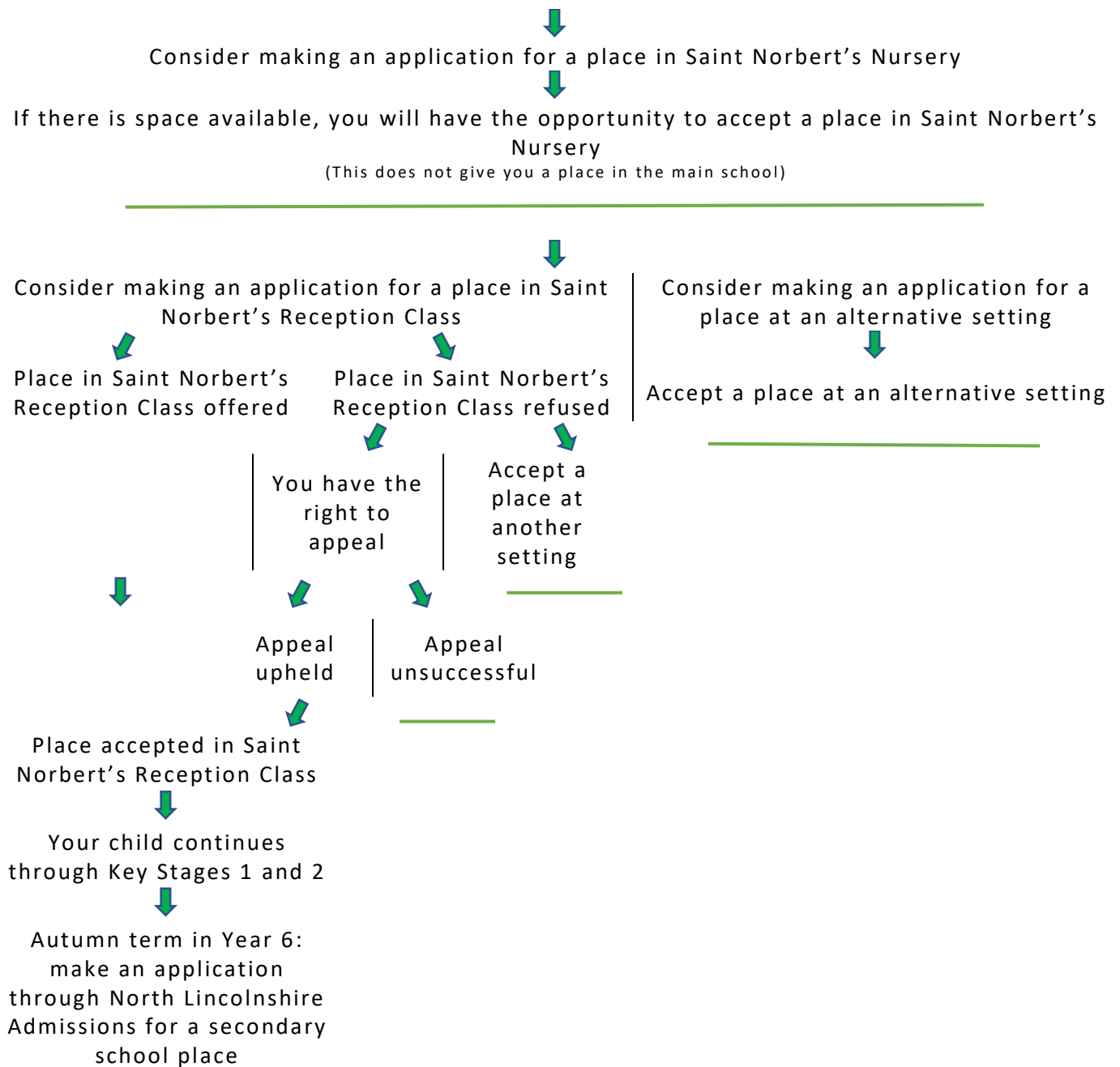
Our aim is to establish a firm partnership between parents and teachers from the very beginning so that the education and the development of all children can be shared.

Starting at Saint Norbert's

NURSERY

Our Nursery operates within the Early Years setting and is separate from the main school. This is open to all children in the term after their third birthday. For further information, please contact the school office staff, who will be very happy to provide further details.

Taking a place in the Nursery will not guarantee a place in the school's Reception class and parents/guardians should apply through North Lincolnshire Admissions, subject to the Admissions Policy of Our Lady of Lourdes Multi-Academy Trust.

ADMISSIONS

The Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Multi-Academy Trust is the admission authority for all the schools within the Trust and is responsible for determining the admissions policy. On behalf of the Trust, the admissions are coordinated by the relevant Local Authority.

All decisions relating to admission applications will be taken by the school's Local Governing Body. Applications must be made on the Common Application Form provided by the Local Authority, North Lincolnshire County Council. Further information can be found on their website.

WHEN YOUR CHILD IS ALLOCATED A SCHOOL PLACE

Prior to entering the Reception Year, parents are invited to a 'New Starters' meeting with the Headteacher and the key staff; this provides an opportunity to ask questions and is a general introduction to life at Saint Norbert's.

In order to help children settle happily into our Academy, there will be a period of induction for children so that they can become familiar with their new friends, teachers and surroundings. Additionally, we will also seek to visit your child in his/her own home at a mutually convenient time so that you can use this opportunity to tell us as much as possible about your child. This establishes a friendly relationship in familiar surroundings, enabling your child to feel more confident before beginning school. Our aim is to find out about his/her personal interests so that we can create opportunities for personalised learning.

The Headteacher and Staff are always available to answer any queries or discuss concerns. Since the beginning of the day is a busy time, it is usually more convenient to talk to teachers after school. Parent consultation meetings provide the opportunity to discuss any concerns or suggestions; at the same time, the Headteacher, and / or Special Needs Co-ordinator, will be available to answer any queries regarding additional needs. We aim to bring out the best in every child, enabling him or her to make swift progress and fulfil his or her potential.

HOME-SCHOOL AGREEMENT

Before your child begins at St Norbert's, you are asked to sign a copy of the Home-School Agreement.



AWARDS AND REWARDS

As a 'Rights Respecting School', the children are taught about their rights and how each person should be treated with respect. Our Good Behaviour Policy - available to view on the school website - is the result of a collaborative effort between children, parents, governors and staff. We therefore encourage positive behaviour through a system of rewards, which includes stickers, praise in assemblies, prizes and the weekly issue of 'Good Behaviour', 'Good Work' and 'Following the Footprints' badges. Our established system of merits and certificates also provides ample opportunities for us to celebrate children's successes in all areas of school life.

PARKING OUTSIDE SCHOOL

Wherever possible, please consider parking away from the school entrance and walking the remainder of the journey. Please do not park vehicles on or opposite the yellow lines outside school as this is a road traffic offence and can be a danger to children. Furthermore, please do not park on paths around school. St Norbert's Church driveway is part of a private residence and must not be used to access the school or to drop off.

MORNING ENTRY TO SCHOOL

All children should arrive through the pedestrian gate situated on Fieldside. Unless using Breakfast Club, children may otherwise arrive from 8:20am. Learning begins **by** 8:30am so it is important that children are ready, settled and comfortable in their classrooms before this time.

BREAKFAST CLUB

There is a daily Breakfast Club every day from 7:45am, during which activities are provided. Children are offered a good selection of nutritious food. The session costs £2.10 per day.

FRUIT

Children in the Early Years and Key Stage One will receive free fruit during the day. Children in Key Stage Two may bring a fruit snack to eat during playtime.

LEAVING SCHOOL AT THE END OF THE DAY

Children will usually leave at staggered times (youngest first) onto the school playground. Children are not permitted to ride bicycles or scooters on the playground or on the pathway leading into school at this time, to minimise the risk of accidents.

GOLDSTAR OUT OF SCHOOL CLUB

This is available every day from 3pm until 6pm and includes a healthy snack meal, as well as a range of activities. Bookings and payment – which should be completed in advance – can be made using Arbor. The cost per session is £10.20 per child, with a discounted price of £8.20 for other children from the same family making a booking on the same day. Please contact our school office for details.

HOLIDAYS AND ABSENCES

Please note that we are unable to authorise holidays during term-time; as such, these are usually defined as unauthorised absence and may lead to a fine. All absences must be reported via a telephone call on the day in question or in writing beforehand (in the case of a medical appointment, for example).

Our Curriculum

We are committed to offering an academic curriculum of excellence within a caring, Christian environment. Further details can be found on our website, which also includes termly curriculum newsletters sharing details of the learning planned in your child's class for the term ahead.

OUR AIMS

- To help pupils use language and number effectively;
- to help pupils to develop in the basic areas of competence needed for varying employment patterns in a rapidly-changing world;
- to help pupils to understand the world in which they live, and the interdependence of individuals, groups, nations and the environment;

- d) to help pupils to develop lively, enquiring, imaginative and creative minds, with the ability to question and argue rationally and to apply themselves to tasks;
- e) to help pupils to develop fit, healthy bodies and equip them with a wide range of physical skills;
- f) to help pupils develop aesthetic awareness;
- g) to help the children appreciate human achievement and aspirations;
- h) to help pupils to develop interests and skills which will enable them to enjoy and make the best use of leisure time;
- i) to help pupils to develop a set of reasoned attitudes, values and beliefs, based on the Christian principles of the Catholic Faith;
- j) to help children understand the multi-cultural nature of society, to foster respect for those of different religions, beliefs and ways of life, and to develop an attitude which is opposed to discrimination of any sort;
- k) to help children to develop a sense of self-respect with the capacity to live as both independent, self-motivated and self-disciplined adults and as contributory members within their own families and society as a whole;
- l) to find out about children's interests in order to personalise learning;
- m) to teach children how to keep safe both in and out of school.

EARLY YEARS

Every opportunity is taken to ensure that children can access the full curriculum as soon as possible during their Early Years. Under the supervision of the Class Teacher in Reception and Early Years Practitioner in the Nursery, learning takes place through adult-led and child-initiated activities which teach children about their world, about themselves and about others.

Provision is closely matched to our bespoke curriculum plans. We also develop language, imagination and creativity whilst encouraging perseverance, good concentration and a positive attitude to learning. The basic skills of reading, writing and number and scientific enquiry underpin these activities. Physical development is also targeted as a prime area.

We know how important the role of parents is in the education of their children – the average child learns more in the first five years than during the whole of the rest of his/her life.

At St Norbert's, and where children are still being taught phonics through our Read Write Inc. programme, they will each bring home:

1. A ReadWriteInc. book bag book which matches their current learning in school.
2. A ReadWriteInc. e-book – shared via Oxford Owl – of the same level which studied in class.
3. A 'sharing' book from a selection of age-appropriate books to read with an adult at home. These books should be read by the adult and enjoyed together during 'story time' to develop a love of reading.

Parents are also encouraged to supplement this reading by hearing your own child read, recording progress in the Reading Record Book.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Every opportunity and encouragement is given to enable our pupils to grow in faith and spirituality; we use a variety of teaching methods appropriate to their age and ability. Learning and growth in faith are promoted through the children's own personal experiences, together with active participation in all aspects of their Religious Education. These are combined with the our diocesan scheme of work, fulfilling the requirements of the Religious Education Curriculum Directory for Catholic Schools, plus scripture, liturgy and traditional prayers, focused on a 'living faith' which also acknowledges the integrity of other faiths.

The Church's insight into the human person, the concern we have for the well-being of each individual and the quality of relationships in our community are at the heart of all that we do to enable our young people to develop both spiritually and morally. Opportunities for celebration and worship include whole-school and class assemblies, masses, carol services and daily prayer. Parents are invited to share in our worship every term.

We do hope you and your children will take part in these opportunities for worship. However, if you do not wish to be included, we will respect your right to withdraw your children from this aspect of our school life.

RELATIONSHIPS AND SEX EDUCATION (RSE)

'Journey in Love' and 'TenTen' are the recommended resources for Catholic schools which we use for Relationship and Sex Education; they have been designed to support the Religious Education, PSHE and Science curricula taught within school.

Throughout our work, children and young people are encouraged to marvel at the wonder and beauty of God's creative love. This is reflected in each stage of a person's growth in the Primary Years through a series of suggested, progressive and developmental tasks, activities and reflections which focus on physical, social, emotional, intellectual and spiritual development.

As with all aspects of learning, children are naturally curious and many will have questions related to their lessons. Opportunities to discuss questions form part of the lessons and again these are treated with care and understanding. Our approach highlights the importance of parental input and children will be told to discuss their lessons at home. As a parent, you have the right to withdraw your child from RSE lessons at any time if you wish to do so, though not from those elements which also form part of the Science curriculum.

HANDWRITING

Children are taught to use joined cursive script as soon as they have gained confidence in their handwriting. By the end of Year 1, most children should be using joined writing.

KEY STAGE ONE (KS1) AND KEY STAGE TWO (KS2)

The school curriculum comprises all learning and other experiences that each setting designs for its pupils. Our approach is underpinned by the National Curriculum and organised into blocks of years called 'Key Stages' (KS).

'Key Stage 1'	refers to Years 1-2 (up to 7 years)
'Key Stage 2'	refers to Year 3-6 (from 7 to 11 years)

Throughout and at the end of each year, your child's teacher will assess how successfully he or she has achieved our school curriculum-related expectations.

Our school curriculum provides pupils with instruction in the essential knowledge that they need to be educated citizens. It introduces them to the best that has been thought and said, helping to engender an appreciation of human creativity and achievement. But our planned curriculum is just one component in the journey of every child as he or she moves through life at Saint Norbert's; it provides an outline of core knowledge around which teachers can develop exciting and stimulating lessons to promote the development of pupils' knowledge, understanding and skills. In short, we aim to develop the 'whole child'.

At Saint Norbert's, our KS1 and KS2 curriculum is comprised of: English, Maths, Science, Computing, RE, History, Geography, Music, Art, Design Technology, Modern Foreign Languages (French in KS2) and Physical Education (PE). We have established programmes of study which are bespoke to our setting, outlining the specific knowledge and skills children will be taught (our 'intent'). Personal Social Health Education, Relationships Education and Citizenship is also taught throughout the school.

THE WIDER CURRICULUM

We know that academic success is important and we strive for high standards. However, we also celebrate creative, physical and spiritual achievement. We are strategic in our holistic approach to each child's development, our guiding principles being to nurture talent, develop virtues and inspire values which prepare our children to lead full and rewarding lives.

From the first days at Saint Norbert's, our 'Whole Child Curriculum' enables us to focus beyond purely subject-specific study; our provision for each child is therefore planned before his or her journey through school begins. In this way, we can ensure that attention has been paid to every aspect of what we believe to be a crucial set of experiences for each learner.

All pupils are encouraged to participate in, engage with and commit to school life. A wide range of experiences is offered, from participation in local festivals and events, to sporting fixtures, creative opportunities in Art and Design Technology, musical activities and many more. Our work is further underpinned and enhanced by our close ties with the church community and our Gospel values. We encourage the children to learn in a practical way and also use the outdoor environment as a regular teaching and learning opportunity. Regular visits and visitors significantly enrich our provision.

A wide range of extra-curricular activities is offered by school staff and visitors, including revision booster clubs, sports, gardening, arts and crafts, our library, drama and music. Wherever possible, clubs are free-of-charge to give all pupils equal opportunity to participate.

HOMEWORK

The school follows a structured programme of homework. We provide children with a Homework Diary, into which we also record key events; homework tasks themselves are shared by Class Teachers – usually on Fridays.

Homework is set on a weekly basis and families are welcome to discuss ways in which our homework programme might be further personalised with Class Teachers.

ASSESSMENT

At Saint Norbert's, we recognise the importance of feedback as an integral part of the teaching and learning cycle, and aim to maximise the effectiveness of its use in practice. We are mindful also of the research surrounding effective feedback and the workload implications of written marking, as well as research from cognitive science regarding the fragility of new learning. We adopt different approaches depending on the curriculum subject.

The aims of assessment and feedback in our setting are:

- To redirect or refocus either the teacher's or the learner's actions to achieve a goal;
- to be specific, accurate and clear;
- to encourage and support further effort;
- to ensure that feedback is meaningful;
- to put the onus on children to correct their own mistakes, rather than providing correct answers for them;
- to alert the teacher to misconceptions, so that the teacher can address these in subsequent lessons.

Right from their very earliest days in school, your child is assessed using 'Development Matters' and the Early Years Foundation Stage Profile. This process is ongoing and progress is closely monitored. Close contact is kept with you, as we recognise the importance of working together at this early stage.

Throughout a child's education at St. Norbert's, continuous assessment by Class Teachers will take place to inform the next stage of learning. This will also be supplemented by more formal assessments from time to time, as appropriate and also in accordance with the Department for Education's statutory assessment arrangements. Please consult our Assessment Policy for further details.

REPORTING TO PARENTS

Stay and Play sessions provide Nursery parents with opportunities to discuss progress from an early stage.

We provide face-to-face parent consultation meetings in the Advent (Autumn) and Lent (Spring) terms. An end-of-year written report for each child is sent to parents with an optional opportunity to meet with Class Teachers in July, if required. However, you are welcome to see children's work at any time during the term; we simply ask that you give Class Teachers sufficient advance notice, please. For children with special needs, additional meetings are held each term to review personalised targets.

The Headteacher is very happy to discuss any aspect of your child's education. Please telephone or visit the office if you wish to make an appointment.

QUALITY LEARNING

We make every effort to maximise learning time in school and to minimise any wasted or disrupted time. Classroom organisation is a critical issue for teachers. Each class is organised to encourage independence and effective learning. A variety of strategies is used by the Class Teacher.

Within each class, work may be scaffolded or additional challenge provided during any given lesson; this enables us to meet the needs of different children. There will also be times when small groups of children may be working together collaboratively in a lesson. Children may work individually on projects that they are developing. Teachers at St. Norbert's plan thoroughly for the term ahead, which forms part of our two-year, long-term curriculum plan. More information about the school curriculum can be found on our website.

Pastoral Care

The pastoral care of the children is the responsibility of all staff with the help, support and guidance of the Headteacher. Our 'named person' is Mrs Mell and she is available throughout the day. The Safe School Ambassadors, also led by Mrs Mell, are a group of children who help to ensure all the children's well-being and happiness. They have many responsibilities, including attending to our Buddy Bus Stop.

CLASS GROUPS

There may occasionally be a need for children from the same year group to be taught in different classes. If this *is* ever necessary, each decision is always made holistically – after professional consideration of a child's ability and maturity – and will be made in the best interests of the child.

KEEPING HEALTHY

We are a Healthy School and our curriculum provides many opportunities for children to learn about keeping healthy. During the Reception Year, children have a basic health screen. If a child has a serious or recurrent problem, it is essential that families notify us so that we can make reasonable adjustments to accommodate individual need.

ACCIDENT/ILLNESS

First aid is given at school where necessary. If a child has an accident or is taken ill while at school, we will contact parents; all staff have had training in First Aid. **Please make sure that you provide us with a reliable, up-to-date contact telephone number.**

MEDICINES

Medicines should not be brought in by children. Instead, parents should always report to the School Office if the giving of prescription medication is required so that this might be strictly monitored. Please view our Medical Needs Policy for more information. Mr Dawson is the Designated Senior Lead for the Medical Needs Policy.

CHILDHOOD INFECTIONS

Please do not send children to school if they are feeling unwell or have had sickness or diarrhoea recently. Do contact the school office for further advice if you need it.



Uniform

We have a long tradition of simple and smart uniform, which is explained to all families upon accepting a place at Saint Norbert's. Our primary aim is to enable children to focus on learning, rather than becoming preoccupied with their appearance in school. We also seek to ensure that costs remain low and offer support with uniform wherever possible. Please adhere to the uniform and do not buy things that are '*a bit different*' - such as fashion blouses or fashion skirts - as this undermines our efforts to keep costs low and creates a perception of pressure on other children to '*keep up*'. Thank you for your understanding and support.

If you have any difficulty getting uniform for your child, please contact the Headteacher – Mr Dawson – in confidence.

Boys' Winter Uniform

- Dark green school jumper
- White collared shirt
- Green-gold school tie
- Plain black school trousers (no jeans)
- Black socks
- Black shoes - no trainers are allowed

Boys' Summer Uniform

- Dark green school jumper
- White short-sleeved collared shirt
- Green-gold school tie
- Plain black school shorts or trousers (no jeans)
- Black socks (plain)
- Black shoes or sandals - no trainers are allowed

PE Uniform

All children:

- White T-shirt
- Black shorts
- Black canvas plimsolls or all-black trainers with no visible logos

All-Weather Play Uniform

All children:

- Warm waterproof coat/jacket (any colour)
- Wellington boots (any colour)
- 'Bag for Life' in which to store wet/muddy wellies

Girls' Winter Uniform

- Dark green school cardigan
- White collared shirt
- Green-gold school tie
- Plain grey school skirt or plain grey pinafore dress (not fashion wear); plain black school trousers (no jeans) are an option
- With a skirt or pinafore dress: white socks or grey tights
- With optional trousers: black socks
- Black shoes - no trainers are allowed

Girls' Summer Uniform

- Dark green school cardigan
- Green and white gingham checked short-sleeved dress (checks not stripes)
- White socks (plain)
- Black shoes or sandals - no trainers are allowed

- In cold weather, black jogging bottoms or a black tracksuit
- No logos - this is to ensure that our uniform remains affordable

- Gloves / scarf for colder weather play (any colour)
- Please aim for the most inexpensive items – they are likely to get wet and muddy

NAME LABELS

Please make sure that all items of clothing and belongings are clearly marked with your child's name.

SUN HATS

All children should have a sun hat so that they can continue to play safely outside in sunny weather. Green legionnaire-style hats can be purchased from the school office. Other sun hats are allowed and we always encourage the use of the most inexpensive option.

JEWELLERY

Jewellery - including earrings - is not allowed in school at any time, including non-uniform days.

HAIR AND MAKEUP

Severe hairstyles, such as coloured hair or shaved patterns, are not permitted. Children should also not come to school wearing nail varnish.

Long hair - on girls or boys - should be tied back; this reduces the likelihood that head lice may spread, as well as keeping hair tidy. If needed, hairbands, clips or bobbles should be black or green and discreet.

MOBILE PHONES / SMART DEVICES

For a number of reasons, these are not permitted and should not be brought in to school or on any school visit.

LEAVERS' MERCHANDISE

Leavers' merchandise, including - but not limited to - items such as hoodies, hats or t-shirts, is not endorsed by the school and restricts our efforts to keep uniform costs low. Our preferred approach is to allow Year 6 Leavers to have their white school shirts signed by friends and staff on the last day of term, if they so wish. Unless specifically invited to wear non-uniform during the year, children should wear school uniform at all other times.

Lunches

The present weekly charge is £13 (£2.60 daily) for a child in KS2. For a child in Nursery, the weekly charge is £12 (£2.40 daily). For a child in Reception or KS1, school meals are free. There is a choice of a hot meal, vegetarian hot meal or jacket potato; children can also order sandwiches if they wish to. Orders are submitted using our online form. We operate a cashless payment system – Arbor – and one week's notice is required if you intend to change from hot meals to packed lunch; please inform the school office.

Packed lunches should be healthy and well-balanced; please do not send sweets or chocolate bars. We are also unable to allow hot food in packed lunches.

WATER

We want to provide a healthy environment for all our pupils to thrive, so we are proud to be a water-only school; this means that we promote water and plain reduced fat milk (skimmed and semi skimmed, lactose free and soya milk) as the only drinks available at school (unless for medical reasons). Schools are ideally placed to provide an environment that helps pupils to be as healthy as possible giving them the best chance in life. As part of that commitment, we are uniquely placed to provide an environment where the healthy and most affordable choice is the easy one.

We care about our pupil's health and wellbeing so we will continue to promote water as the best option and help pupils understand the importance of healthy drink choices and the benefits of consuming water. We will also ensure our staff are committed to model healthy drinking habits.

Drinking water is provided at lunchtimes for all children, whether taking a school meal or bringing a packed lunch. All children are asked to bring a water bottle from which to drink in class and throughout the day. These can be purchased from the office if required. Other drinks should not be brought in to school.
